Anne's House of **Dreams**






is a green-fingered friend to delegate to!

The cake: If there is anyone in the family circle who fancies themselves as








The photos & video: Most people opt for the professionals for the wedding album. However, there is no harm in doing some research-a friend with a good camcorder might be up to the task of the wedding video.
